

For the 2020-21 Academic/Program Year Providence Campus




TREATMENT OUTCOMES



CHRISTMAS AT OCEAN TIDES

One of the most anticipated annual events at Ocean Tides is our Christmas Celebration. The tradition continued this year for our young men even during the challenges of the COVID pandemic. The special meaning of Christmas was more important than ever this year as it was going to



be the first time our young men had an extended home pass since March 2020. It was also at the end of a couple of weeks of quarantine/isolation for some young men who had tested COVID positive, as we worked to keep everyone else safe and healthy. The modified celebration included a special lunch for young men and staff, and the usual parade of gifts coordinated by our staff. The feelings of gratitude, care, and love were visible on the faces of everyone in the room. We are always thankful to all in our community of friends, neighbors, and supporters for the help they offer to make this event a huge and special success each year.

NURSING HOME SERVICE

Remember classic 5 color/flavored LifeSavers? Or how nice it is to receive a note card sent by a loved one? Because Ocean Tides young men could not go to do their usual service in local nursing homes, they decided to send care packages instead. Some 250 care packages were sent to local nursing homes usually visited, as well as De La Salle Hall, the Brothers nursing facility in New Jersey. The packages included word search



books, hand lotion, and a deck of playing cards. Each nursing home also received jigsaw puzzles to share. An important part of what happens at Ocean Tides is learning to care for others, not just yourself, and our community service activities help to achieve that. Thanks to Mr. Ward and others who make these activities possible.

A STAFF THAT CARES

The hallmark of Lasallian Education for our young men is the relationships that develop between them, and the adults that care for them during their time with us. It is the miracle of touching hearts that happens on an evening in the residential program when that conversation just feels right, and a residential counselor offers a young man special mentoring. Or it is when a teacher spends that extra time next to that desk helping a young man, and suddenly the light of understanding shines brightly. Sometimes, a young man who is struggling finds out that it will be 'OK' because caring adults will be there for him, and with tears wiped away, together, they can work on a path forward.



















THE BEAT GOES ON





A few years ago, Ocean Tides in Narragansett began a Music Production program. Young men had the ability to use all the latest technology to produce their own sounds and recordings. The program is one of the most popular classes at Ocean Tides. The program has expanded on a limited basis to our Providence Campus as well. During this past year we added musical instrument instruction to our offerings, thanks to our music teacher, Mr. John Vaughn, and gen-

erous folks who cleaned out their closets. Trumpet, drums, guitar, sax, and piano are among the starting points. At the same time, Ms. Elana Levizon brought the idea of musical expression into some of her groups creating a Drum Circle program as well. Creative expression has helped young men share of themselves and do things they might not have otherwise tried.

We continue to expand the number of options we have available for our young men through our pet therapy program. What started out, and continues with canine pet therapy with Ocean Tides' board member and researcher, Judy VanWyk, grew to include equine therapy thanks to the interest and expertise of our school counselor, Casie Staruk. The 2021-22 year will include bovine therapy under the guidance of Susan Vogl, our director of social services.

In each case, the activities vary but allow for the development of empathy, care, and understanding for another. Counselors are then able to use the experiences and examples from pet therapies as metaphors for what a young man might think about doing in their daily interactions with others, not just the animals involved in therapy. Experiential learning and counseling in this nature is another



highly effective tool we use to assist our young men in developing the skills and insights for their best possible futures.

LASALLIANS OF THE YEAR

Founders Week 2021

We have remembered the care that is given our young men when the rest of the staff is at home, but residential counselors keep watch and care in that special Ocean Tides way. We have thanked our social service staff for being bridge and connection between young men, their families, and the agencies we partner with, who also listen and guide to new insights and understanding. We celebrated the quiet successes created in classrooms each day by our teachers and school staff, showing kids that they can have academic success if they only believe in themselves, and we have thanked the folks who care while doing all the things that keep everything working and going smoothly. We touch hearts, teach minds, and transform lives because of each of them every day at Ocean Tides.

All that greatness happens each day and has continued each day even during these last 14 months of a pandemic, when our our Lasallian value of "entrusted to our care" took on new meaning. For the first 4-5 months of that pandemic our young men were here with us. They did not leave 635 as we worked so hard to keep them safe. But they did not leave our care as they always had, for trips to the beach, or Brickley's or bowling and a movie, or a home pass. They really were ours 24/7 because we had to keep them safe and healthy. Every staff member closed the gaps, offered caring at a new level, built stronger and better relationships, and spent more time over close to 150 days when we were home and stand-in family for our young men.

Then we stepped up together through the stressors of those first tests to make sure everyone was healthy. And worked together that one and only time we had a group that needed isolation and, together, we basically opened a standalone group home for 10 days and staffed it. We also said, 'please pull your mask up' more times than a lifeguard says 'no running on the deck' to energetic youngsters. We watched Disney movies, and did projects, and played games, ran loops around the property and so many other things. We spent extra time on off hours when it was time to allow families to visit on their schedules and worked together to figure out how to keep everyone healthy and safe when it was time to begin again with activities and travel off property. Everyone stepped up in so many ways. It worked because we cared together.

And so, there is no way to single out one Lasallian this year. So, we celebrate *all* the caring adults, caring Lasallians, who keep the values and the attributes of Lasallian care and education central to our work and how they approach it. This past year was only possible because of how we did so much "together and by association." Thank you to each one of you who shares this caring ministry and makes the lives of kids and families better each day.
